Born in Middleburg, The Netherlands,
January 15th 1915

1932 Etty moved to Amsterdam to study law and Slavic languages. She lived with an accountant - Hans Wegerif, with whom she had a relationship.

1941 Met Julius Spear

Feb 3rd 1941 The day Etty said she was actually born i.e. when she met Julius Spear and started her diary.

July 1942 started working at the Westerbork transit camp

September 1942 Spier died
