Aspen Chapel Community Financial Update


For 2024 our total expenses were \$608K up from \$595k in '23 (a 1% increase in spite of higher inflation). Our bottom line was essentially a breakeven. This result is in spite of our incurring higher building costs and some diverted donations due to the building Trustees' legal challenges. And, our having a successful, separate fundraiser to ensure Vesey-family, housing stability through June 30, 2028.

For the first few months of '25, we are off to an even better start than in '24 with both expenses down and incoming funds up. There is measurably big, new interest in all-things Chapel thanks to - the Marianne Williamson event in December and new video content and events via Aspenwisdom.org. Here's hoping that in spite of recent global financial turbulence, we will continue to improve the vitality and financial stability of the Aspen Chapel Community.

Nicholas' Story Spiritual Leader

I live my life with the Chapel as the backdrop. First and foremost I look to my family. Sam in college at Skidmore, Jessica at NYU Tisch, and Heather as my partner.

Then, everything else comes under that backdrop of the Chapel. How can I support the community I serve to be the best it can be in making this world a better place.

The engine room of this work is my meditation practice in the morning. I get to the Chapel between 6 and 6.30am, and then spend about an hour and a quarter in my practice.

This shapes my day, my week and the foreseeable future.

Out of my practice comes ideas for talks, for programs and for the general direction that I navigate for the future.

I spend a huge part of the day at my computer; writing, organizing the websites, doing marketing, posters, videos and press releases.

That is punctuated by people dropping in to chat, to give me ideas, or even feedback on what I am doing.

I see the context of my life as being global. I think globally and nationally, but act locally. I want us to be relevant and effective.

I pay attention to numbers – how many in the Chapel on a Sunday (about 55), how many on line (about 200) and posts and likes around what we do.

It is an all consuming occupation, and to relax I like to cook, swim, watch TV, read and spend time with the family.

I feel very lucky in what I do. I see my main task as being reaching for that special place within us all that feeds each of us and those all around us. If we can do that, then we will have made our contribution.


The event was sponsored by the 'Journal of Religion and Film', and we will be repeating the series in the fall.

Before accepting the offer to be the Board Chair amidst Covid challenges, I re-read our mission statement and got energized to serve. Our founders' concerns and wishes (in the late '60's) are even more relevant today. Thanks to our in-house, audio-visual capabilities and covid's zoomification of the world, we can now: "engage religious faith in conversation with the world...to seek relevant answers in a troubled world...(and) here create a national-global ecumenical center".

How so? Our virtual-reach trends are strong. Our on-line-service attendance is now four times our physical attendance and growing. The stats for our "Aspen Initiative" webinar via our AspenWisdom.org site have involved many spiritual leaders and reached tens of thousands of viewers around the world (and also growing). Nicholas' forthcoming, June 7th-8th, sequel to the initial webinar (still under development) has an even bigger potential reach. These outreach stats are in turn growing our core: physical-attendance community, fundraising and constellation of wisdom contributors.

"Wisdom" has been cherished and pursued by philosophers and spiritual traditions since recorded time. Today, it's in short supply. I believe that we, at the Aspen Chapel, can help more people around the world get a bit wiser a bit sooner to find both peace and the desire to serve the greater good. We will always have more work to do, but let's see if we can't continue to fulfill our founders' vision in an economically viable way.

The Aspen Chapel Gallery

This will be an exciting year for the Aspen Chapel Gallery. Starting in June, 2025, the gallery will be celebrating 40 years of showing the art of local and Roaring Fork Valley artists. Plan on helping us celebrate this anniversary with the opening of the 259th exhibition, CLIMATE, May 28.

The 39th year had 9 shows including the 4 Rivers Biennial, a juried show open to all artists in the valley.

Our nonprofit partners included The Sopris Sun, The Aspen Historical Society, High Rockies Harm Reduction, Teaching Artists Program of the Aspen Art Museum, Summit 54, The Aspen Sister Cities Bariloche Artist Exchange Program, Connect!, Holiday Baskets, and Aspen, Basalt, Roaring Fork, Colorado Rocky Mountain School, and Glenwood Springs high school art departments, We were able to donate \$11,317 this year giving the Gallery a total of \$79,378 in donations back to nonprofits and the school art programs.

The core of the gallery are the volunteer curators – Amy Beidleman, Kathy Honea, Sam Louras, Glen Watts, and Doug Graybeal who retired at the end of the year. Curt Carpenter is the guest curator for 2025.

The Roaring Fork Valley is blessed with so many talented artists and we are pleased to be one of the only galleries dedicated to showing their art.

Please join us! We would be glad to guide you to a place of infinite nourishment and inner peace.


